Changes in Curriculum and Educational Philosophy

The schools follows the CAPS Curriculum as per Government directions. The ratio of learners to teacher numbers have increased substantially due to influx of learners from outlying areas.

Teachers regularly attend workshops to improve and upskills themselves.

Challenges and Triumphs

- Teacher - learner ratio is very high 1:45. This is challenging as it is difficult to give enough attention to all the children.
- High levels of administrative work for educators
- Lack of resources, specifically multi-media equipment eg. OHP, whiteboards etc.
- The school is now expected to pay their own water and electricity bills.
- Parents do not pay school fee
- Many learners are on social grants or have one parent households.
- The school does not have computers for the learners
- Many children come to school hungry and this makes it hard for them to learn & concentrate
- Because of transport restraints we are unable to accommodate remedial classes

Community Impact and Outreach

Al-Imdaad Foundation funds the Feeding scheme for learners every morning. A bowl of hot porridge is provided to 120 children each day. This is prepared and distributed by the educators between 7h00 to 7h30 every morning.

The Evolution of Technology and Learning Tools

The school has unfortunately not been provided with equipment or resources to implement upgrades of teaching tools. We do not have computers, internet or online platforms. Most of our learners come from disadvantaged backgrounds and do not have access to technology at home either.

"WITHOUT RELIABLE POTABLE WATER, LEARNERS AND TEACHERS FACED VERY REAL HYGIENE RELATED RISKS. IT IS VERY EASY FOR DISEASE TO SPREAD RAPIDLY THROUGH A SCHOOL POPULATION, WITH THE ADDED DANGER OF LEARNERS THEN SPREADING THE PROBLEM IN THEIR HOME ENVIRONMENTS."

"SCHOOLS HAVE A DUTY OF HEALTHCARE, A RESPONSIBILITY WHICH CANNOT BE TAKEN LIGHTLY. THE PROVISION OF SAFE DRINKING WATER LIES AT THE CORE OF ENSURING A HEALTHY SCHOOL ENVIRONMENT. WITHOUT IT, A SCHOOL CANNOT OPERATE EFFECTIVELY, WITH BOTH TEACHING AND LEARNING COMPROMISED."

HE SAID THAT HARMONY PRIMARY SCHOOL HAD "A LONG AND PROUD TRACK-RECORD" OF CREATING AN ENVIRONMENT CAPABLE OF FOSTERING OPTIMAL LEARNING AND THE CHAMPIONING OF MORAL EXCELLENCE, BUT HAD – IN RECENT TIMES – FOUND ITSELF AT A CRITICAL CROSSROADS IN ITS HISTORY, BECAUSE OF THE UNRELIABLE SUPPLY OF WATER IT FACED AND THE ASSOCIATED HEALTH RISKS THIS BROUGHT TO ITS DOORS.

"THE SCHOOL RECOGNIZED THE NEED TO PRIORITIZE THE PROVISION OF CLEAN, POTABLE WATER FOR DRINKING, WASHING, AND THE FLUSHING OF TOILETS, BUT THE COSTS OF ADDRESSING THIS CHALLENGE WERE SIMPLY BEYOND THE FINANCIAL MEANS OF THE SCHOOL. ACCORDINGLY, WE OF THE SAMCT WERE VERY PLEASED TO BE ABLE TO ASSIST BY COVERING THE COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH DRILLING AND INSTALLING A BOREHOLE AT THE SCHOOL, EFFECTIVELY REMOVING A MAJOR BARRIER TO A RETURN TO NORMAL EFFECTIVE AND EFFICIENT LESSONS FOR STAFF AND LEARNERS ALIKE," MR.
